

LESSON PLAN TITLE: My Tree is...

Writer-in-Residence: Kyle Hunt

Grade Level: 2nd - 4th

Model Works Used: When Grandma Gives You A Lemon Tree by Jamie L. B. Deenihan and Lorraine Rocha

Literary Learning objective(s): Students will be able to explore sensory detail and descriptive use of language, write for an audience and add detail to previous writing.

Themes: Imagination, nature, gifts, metaphor

MDE/SEL Standards: Stress management, self-motivation, communicating clearly, considering the well-being of self and others, knowledge of language / reading closely, key ideas and details

Materials Needed: Worksheet, pencil, computer, internet

Opening Activity:

I want you to use your mind to create an image of a pencil and hold it in your hand. Next, I want you to hold it up in the air and draw a circle. Now, turn the circle into a smiley face. Now, use your hand as an eraser and erase the smiley face!

Next, I want you to draw a house. Put people in the house. Put a chimney on the house. Make smoke come out of the chimney. Draw some clouds and a sun. Add whatever else you want to the picture, and then erase this one too.

Next, I want you to draw a tree. A HUGE tree, as big as the room! Let it grow larger and larger with each stroke of your pencil!

Once you've finished drawing your tree, I want you to do a trick with your drawing. I'll tell you what to do: take your tree and shrink it smaller with your hands. Squeeeeeeeze the tree to make it small. Tie an imaginary string to your tree and fly it around the room like a kite! Be careful not to knock anything over with it!

Finally, when you're done flying your tree like a kite, I want you to set your tree aside for later!

Pre-Discussion:

You might think an imaginary tree is strange. Why would we fly it like a kite? Why would we draw it in the sky? Well, we are using our imaginations in a powerful way. We are exercising our imaginations to make them stronger!

Sometimes, writers use their imaginations in powerful ways. One way is to inspire other people, or to make others happy.

Let's read a story that started out in someone's imagination. This is a story about a tree and giving gifts. It's called, *When Grandma Gives You A Lemon Tree*. It's written by Jamie L. B. Deenihan and illustrated by Lorraine Rocha. Watch the video to hear me read the story!

Prewriting

Next we're going to add to our trees by writing about them. First, write down what kind of tree you have. Is it an apple tree? A pear tree? Maybe it's a new kind of tree no one has ever heard of? What kind of tree is it?
