Borrowed Lines

DURATION: 1.5 hours

GRADE LEVEL: High School

WRITING LEVEL: Developing and experienced writers

FOCUS: creative process; revision

EXAMPLE TEXT

A Course in Miracles
by Meg Fritag

Check in | 15 minutes

Pick any word at random and write it down. Come up with a six-word story using your word as the title. This means that your story could be "about" the word you chose or just inspired by it. Think of the way stories and poems are titled: They aren't always strictly about the title, but it does encapsulate something about the story.

Resource Building | 15 minutes

EXERCISE | Write one short sentence or phrase using each of these words: lemons, money, grass, fire, skinny and bed.

- Consider the music of your sentences more than whether or not they make sense.
- Example: For the word "animal: through the body like glass, instincts fell

Close Reading | 20 minutes

OUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- What's happening in this poem?
- Why are the situations so specific?
- What might the ghosts represent?
- How are the ghosts like skinny shelter cats? Why do they follow you around?
- Why should the ghosts stay?
- How are the fires connected to the ghosts?

Writing Prompt | 30 minutes

PART 1: SEE WORKSHEET INCLUDED

Fill in the blanks to create a poem using the lines from Meg Freitag's poem. The poem does not have to make perfect sense; again, consider the music of your lines more than whether they make sense.

Use your six sentences from the opening exercise. What happens when you simply plug some of those lines into the blank spaces? Odds are, the poem will not make sense -- and that's okay.

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PART 2

Once you have filled in all the blanks, cross out the Meg Freitag lines, leaving only your lines. Now, once again, fill in those blanks with more of your original lines.

When you are finished, you likely will not have a completed poem. Much of it will not make sense. Here, revise your poem in any way you see fit (cut lines or words; add more lines or words, etc.).

When you feel your poem is complete, give it a title.
